- Overseeing the Aldermanic intern program and conducting trainings, briefings and seminars upon the request of Council members

Intergovernmental agreement with Chicago Board of Education for Tax Increment Financing (TIF) assistance for New South Loop Elementary School

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Ward Affected: **3**

O2017-2785 The ordinance authorizes the expenditure of funds from the River South TIF for a new elementary school on the Near South Side, along with a playground and parking lot. The school will be four stories with a capacity of 1,200 students. The construction of the school is anticipated to cost approximately \$61.9 million. The City is allocating \$59 million for the entire project, \$48 million for the construction of the school and the remainder for TIF funded improvements related to the project.

Implementation of various components of Retail Thrive Zones Programs

Sponsors: **Mayor, Sawyer, Mitchell, Thompson, Foulkes, Cochran, Burnett, Austin, Mitts**

Wards Affected: **6, 7, 11, 16, 20, 27, 34, 37**

O2017-2529 The ordinance implements the Retail Thrive program. The ordinance authorizes the expenditure of \$20,000 in each of the eight retail areas. Contracts are authorized with seven not-for-profit community organizations (one organization is administering two areas). The ordinance also authorizes property purchases in these eight areas to be eligible for Class 7(a), 7(b), and 7(c) real estate tax incentives.

Sale of City Owned property and multi-family loan agreement with Brainerd Park Apartments Ltd. Partnership at 8902-8956 S. Loomis St.

O2017-3021 The City is selling twelve properties worth \$1,125,000 for \$12 to a not-for-profit controlled entity. The City also agrees to lend \$1,900,000 of Federal Multi-Family Loans for the construction of affordable housing. The City also transfers low-income housing tax credits worth about \$460,000.

The City agrees to lend Bickerdike \$5,000,000 of Federal Multi-Family Loans for the construction of affordable housing. The City also transfers low-income housing tax credits worth approximately \$400,000 to Bickerdike Redevelopment Corporation.

First Amendment of previous redevelopment agreement with Swedish Covenant Hospital

O2017-2868 The ordinance extends the completion date for the redevelopment at Swedish Covenant Hospital to June 30, 2018. It also revises the schedule of payments from the City to the hospital, but the total amount remains unchanged.

Department of Finance and Office of City Comptroller directed to prepare appropriation ordinance for use of excess earnings on investments for violence prevention and intervention program

Or2017-152 The order requests that the Comptroller work with the Legislative Reference Bureau to draft an ordinance to appropriate \$25 million of proceeds from 2016 investments in excess of the budgeted amount. The order would appropriate the funds to the Department of Family & Support Services, which in turn, would distribute \$500,000 to each ward for violence prevention and intervention programs, including job training and after school programs.

R2017-217 In response to the President's statements that he will withhold federal funds for law enforcement activities to sanctuary cities, the resolution calls on the Budget Director to appear before the Finance Committee to testify about the federal grants received by the City for law enforcement. The resolution further calls on the Law Department to join any legal action challenging the President's authority to withhold these funds.

Call for owners and management of Chicago Cubs organization to reconsider interest in creating cable channel network

O2017-1950 The ordinance amends the Municipal Code to include the municipal identification card program. The program authorizes the City Clerk to implement and administer the City of Chicago ID Card. The City Clerk will not collect and retain any documents provided as proof of identity and residence. The City of Chicago ID Card is valid identification and proof of residency in the City of Chicago.

O2017-2034 The ordinance authorizes an agreement with Ameresco for: (1) LED fixture procurement and installation of approximately 270,000 fixtures; (2) targeted stabilization repairs of existing lighting infrastructure; and (3) design and implementation of the citywide lighting management system that provides for remote monitoring. The MBE/WBE percentages for this contract are 26% and 6%, respectively. Compensation is not to exceed \$150 million.

Annual Appropriation Ordinance Year 2017 amendment within Fund No. 925 for Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events

O2017-1947 The ordinance appropriates \$25,000 from the Millennium Park Foundation to the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events for workout programming at Millennium Park.

O2017-2751 The City is authorized to use approximately 5,000 feet of office space and 1,300 feet of storage space for the bicycle unit of the Police Department at McCormick Place for no charge. The agreement expires at the end of 2021.

Extension of Facilities Use License Agreement with Chicago Police Department for use of classroom space at Kennedy-King College and Dawson Technical Institute

Sponsor: **Mayor**

O2017-2218 The ordinance authorizes the continuation of the usage of the Kennedy-King College Dawson Technical Institute campus and its classrooms for an additional six months for training of officers of the Chicago Police Department at no cost to the City.

Sale of City-owned property at 2440-2452 E 75th St to Copper Realty Investments, LLC

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **7**

O2017-1975 The ordinance authorizes the sale of a City-owned, vacant parcel at 2440-2452 E 75th St to Copper Realty Investments, LLC under the Preserving Communities Together Program (formerly the Chicago Abandoned Properties Program). The parcel currently includes a mixed use building with five commercial units and twelve residential units. Copper Realty will purchase the property for \$1, and rehabilitate all of the units while preserving their initial use (residential or commercial). The twelve residential units will be rented to residents at or below 80% of the Chicago area median income for a period of fifteen years.

Sale of City-owned property at 6420 S St Lawrence Ave to Community Initiatives, Inc.

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **20**

O2017-2015 The ordinance authorizes the sale of a City-owned, vacant parcel at 6420 S St Lawrence Ave to Community Initiatives, Inc. under the Preserving Communities Together Program (formerly the Chicago Abandoned Properties Program). The parcel currently includes a two-story, two-unit residential building. Community Initiatives, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation will purchase the property for \$1 and rehabilitate both units. Both units will be rented to residents at or below 80% of the Chicago area median income for a period of fifteen years.

Call for Mayor and City Council to condemn governmental action to deprive Arab and Muslim Americans or any ethnic or religious group their rights

Sponsor: **J. Moore**

Wards Affected: **All**

R2017-260 The recent promulgation of executive orders that impose travel bans and reinforce federal immigration laws have incited fear of religious or national origin discrimination in many of the Muslim and Arab communities. The resolution calls on all public officials to denounce any unconstitutional governmental action that imposes unfair measures against any U.S. citizen or immigrant based on their religion, ethnicity, or race.

Amendment of Municipal Code 4-60-130 concerning hours of operation for outdoor patios

Wards Affected: **2, 4, 11, 25, 27, 42**

O2017-2011 The ordinance amends the Municipal Code to prohibit the sale or service of alcoholic liquor for consumption in outdoor, privately owned patios between 12:01 a.m. and the legally established hour of opening.

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 9-114 by further regulating charter/sightseeing vehicles

Sponsors: **Mayor, Burke, Mitts, Osterman, Reilly, O'Connor, Reboyras**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-1948 The ordinance further regulates party buses by requiring owners, drivers and chaperones to report any crimes immediately to 911. The driver must obtain signed acknowledgements from passengers of their legal obligations. The owner must permanently affix identifying signage of the passenger's legal obligations, visible from fifty feet away. The bus must have a security camera or a chaperone. Fines are increased and can go up to \$10,000. Minimum fines range from \$100 to \$1,000.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 4-244-164 regarding prohibited acts by street performers

Sponsors: **Hopkins, Reilly**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-1999 The ordinance eliminates the requirement that a performer in the Central Business District and Gold Coast who exceeds the noise requirement must move at least two blocks when requested by a police officer. The prohibition for a street performer that he cannot generate sound louder than a conversation at the distance of two hundred feet is eliminated. Street performers that use a bullhorn, amplification or percussion may perform on Michigan Avenue and State Street only from 11 am to 1 pm and 5-6 pm on weekdays and 1-3 pm on Saturdays.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 4-4-060 concerning license applications, renewals and inspections

Sponsor: **Mitchell**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-2138 The ordinance gives aldermen twenty days to send the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection notice of whether they approve the granting of a business license in their ward.

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 4-236 by modifying Chicago Parking Lot and Garage Operations Tax Ordinance

O2017-1994 The ordinance provides that a reseller of parking spaces gets a credit for taxes paid to another operator so that there is not double taxation.

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 9-64 by adding new Section 9-64-162 entitled School Loading Zone and Section 7-38-142 concerning produce merchants

O2017-2002 The ordinance creates a new category of school loading zones, around schools and day care facilities, exclusively for dropping off and picking up children.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 4-232-080 concerning responsibilities of valet parking operators for business establishments within Central Business District

Sponsor: **Reilly**

Wards Affected: **2, 4, 11, 25, 27, 42**

O2017-1990 Valet operators may operate in the Central Business District from thirty minutes before the business establishment opens to thirty minutes after it closes, or when all cars are retrieved, whichever is later.

Intergovernmental agreement with Chicago Park District for additional police services on Park District properties

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-1956 The ordinance authorizes the City to provide additional patrol services beyond the base service provided to the Chicago Park District from July 2016 through June 2019. All officers will be working overtime. The Park District agrees to reimburse the City up to \$2 million per year in 2016 and 2019, and up to \$4 million per year in 2017 and 2018.

Intergovernmental agreement with Chicago Transit Authority for continuation of Chicago Police Department Voluntary Special Employment Program

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-1953 The ordinance authorizes the City to provide additional services beyond the base service provided to the Chicago Transit Authority from August 2016 through June 2018. The CTA agrees to reimburse the City up to \$30 million for the term of the agreement. The Police Department will assign approximately sixty volunteer officers and eleven supervisors to provide these services.

Donation of City triage unit 8-8-6 (Apparatus #G524) to 5-11 Club, Inc.

O2017-1968 The ordinance authorizes the Commissioner of Fleet Management and the Chief Procurement Officer to donate one Triage Unit to the 5-11 Club, Inc. for donation for use in Mexico.

Call for hearing(s) on status of Project Safe Neighborhoods program

Wards Affected: **All**

R2017-205 Project Safe Neighborhoods is a governmental collaborative approach proven effective to reducing crime. The resolution calls for a hearing on collaborative efforts to fight crime, including Project Safe Neighborhoods, before the May City Council meeting. Entities to testify at this hearing include the Chicago Police Department, Cook County Sheriff's Department, Cook County State's Attorney's Office, U.S. State's Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois, Corporation Counsel and Chicago Crime Commission.

Call for task force to create plans and incentives to reduce recidivism

R2017-172 The resolution calls on the State and Federal government to form a task force with the City to address recidivism.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 10-8-480 to prohibit casting of yard waste on public way or public property

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 13-96 by modifying regulations concerning construction and location in private garages

O2017-1986 The ordinance revises an ordinance passed at the last City Council meeting. It eliminates the height limitation for private garages. The ordinance removes requirements for distance from other buildings of private garages and carports, and removes a requirement for space for refuse containers.

R2017-215 The United States Congress is taking steps to repeal the Federal Communications Commission's rules regarding consumers' privacy which will allow companies to record and sell personal information. Amendment of Municipal Code Chapters 4-151, 17-3 and 17-9 regarding shooting range restrictions

O2017-1949 The ordinance allows minors to enter a shooting range if accompanied by a parent, guardian or instructor. It removes the restriction that a shooting range cannot be within 100 feet of another shooting range. Furthermore, the ordinance eliminates the prohibition of a shooting range within 500 feet of residential, schools, day care, places of worship, libraries, museums, hospitals or premises licensed for retail sales of liquor. Shooting ranges are permitted in these areas as a special use.

Amendment of Municipal Code Titles 3, 4, 8 and 17 regarding licensing consolidation

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-1951 The ordinance provides that the cost of a license on the Riverwalk and the Lakefront for the summer season is \$4,400. The cost of a wholesale tobacco license is \$1,100.

The ordinance replaces the current section of the code regarding tobacco dealers. Licensees cannot be felons, had another license revoked in the prior four years, or have a facility within 100 feet of a day care facility or school. Licensees cannot sell flavored tobacco within 500 feet of a secondary school, provided that licensees prior to 2017 are grandfathered in under prior law. Tobacco sampling is allowed on-site. Cigarette dispensing machines are prohibited.

The Board of Health is authorized to inspect licensed tobacco dealers. On June 1st of every year, the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection (BACP) must submit a report to the City Council Committee on License and Consumer Protection regarding its enforcement activity of the unauthorized sale of "loosies" by licensed dealers in the previous year. The Commissioner of BACP is authorized to institute a program to test whether an establishment is selling tobacco to minors. The Commissioner must submit a quarterly report by the 21st of the next month after the quarter of activities to enforce the prohibition of the sale of tobacco to minors. Licensees must post warnings to minors that they are not legally authorized to purchase tobacco products. Persons under 21 are allowed to work at tobacco dealers as long as they are not involved with tobacco products. The penalty for violating this law ranges from \$200 to \$10,000. Licenses can be revoked for any violation of this law and must be revoked for three violations of certain portions of the law in a 24 month period or two violations of the sale of "loosies" in a 48 month period. There is a \$100 reward for any person who turns in a tobacco dealer that is violating the law. Coupons are not allowed. If the law is found unenforceable, then price floors are established and little cigars must be sold in quantities of at least ten.

The ordinance is effective July 1, 2017. The ordinance must be fully implemented by January 1, 2018.
