- Overseeing the Aldermanic intern program and conducting trainings, briefings and seminars upon the request of Council members

MUNICIPAL CODE AMENDMENTS & ORDINANCES

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 9-102-010 to allow use of photographic traffic control signal monitoring device for illegal use of mobile telephones while driving

Sponsors: **Burke, Beale**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-3352 The ordinance requires the City to use a textalyzer as an automated traffic control system. At the scene of an accident or other traffic violation the police officer would ask for the driver's cell phone and use the textalyzer to determine if the phone was in use at the time of the incident. The textalyzer is currently in beta testing.

TRANSACTIONAL ORDINANCES

Acquisition of property at 5525 W Diversey Ave and issuance of multi-family housing revenue bonds for low-income housing

O2017-3562 A not-for-profit developer is building a 98 room low-income senior housing facility in the Belmont-Cragin neighborhood. The ordinance authorizes the City to obtain a loan from Citibank and then in turn loan that money to the developer. The loan will be for a term of no more than 45 years at an interest rate not to exceed 12%. The City is entitled to a 1.5% administrative fee.

First Amendment to redevelopment agreement with Chicago Neighborhood Initiatives, Inc. for Whole Foods warehouse and distribution facility

Ward Affected: **9**

O2017-3457 The ordinance extends the completion date for the work on the roadway through the end of the year. The amendment also adds the Gateway Project, which includes the construction of a 9,800 square foot building to include a Potbelly's and smaller retail. The project will employ approximately 70 construction workers and on operation the equivalent of 40 full-time employees. Chicago Neighborhood Initiatives, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation is the developer and will receive \$1 million from the North Pullman TIF. The developer also will obtain a \$7.4 million loan from the City. The City is entitled to an annual fee of 5% of the TIF expenditures.

O2017-3377 The ordinance would reinstitute the "Head Tax" in Chicago at a much higher rate than it was previously. The tax would apply to employers with at least fifty employees. An employee is somebody who works in the City for the majority of his work. The Director of Revenue is authorized to issue rules and regulations defining an employee.

The tax would be thirty-three dollars a month per full-time employee. Employers would complete a form and pay a tax for the quarter on the final day of the calendar month for the month after the quarter. Employers must register with the City.

By the fifth day of a month, all Head Tax payments received in the previous month shall be submitted to the Chicago Public Schools. The ordinance does not authorize the City to reimburse itself for the costs of administering the Head Tax.

The recent change of administration has called into question the continuation of the DACA, which allows qualified undocumented young

Amendment of land sale agreement with YMCA for property at 1834 W Lawndale Ave/3707-3709 W Cortland Ave

O2017-3434 The ordinance amends a redevelopment agreement from 1999 with the YMCA for the property at 1834 W Lawndale Ave/3707-3709 W Cortland Ave in the Pulaski Industrial Corridor Redevelopment Project Area.

Under the original redevelopment agreement, YMCA purchased the property from the City for \$1, to construct an approximately 42,000 sq. ft. facility by the end of 2000. The project was subsequently divided into two phases, the first phase included the construction of a facility with a gymnasium, recreational center and day care facility ("Phase I Building"), and the second phase required construction of an aquatic center ("Phase II Aquatic Center"), both phases were subject to MBE/WBE construction and Local Resident hiring requirements. YMCA completed the Phase I Building in 2001, but failed to provide any documentation showing compliance with MBE, WBE, and Local Resident hiring requirements for the Phase I Building.

YMCA is now prepared to begin construction of the Phase II Aquatic Center, which includes a two-story, 13,000 sq. ft. addition to the southern and western end of the Phase I Building, which will have a family locker room, two pools, and two multi-purpose rooms. The property is adjacent to the 606 Trail, and a portion of the property was conveyed to the City by the YMCA to provide public access to the trail. As a settlement for failing to comply with MBE, WBE, and Local Resident hiring requirements while constructing the Phase I Building, YMCA will construct two publicly accessible restrooms in the Phase II Building primarily for users of the 606 Trail. Construction of the Phase II Aquatic Center must comply with current MBE, WBE, and 50% Local Resident hiring requirements. The final budget for the Phase II Aquatic Center is \$9,324,693 and the preliminary MBE/WBE budget for the project is \$5,748,319.

First amendment to deed restrictions for property at 313 N Whipple St and 3024-3030 W Fulton Blvd and sale to Fulton-Whipple, LLC for construction of natural or artificial turf athletic field or surface parking lot

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Ward Affected: **27**

O2017-3321 The ordinance amends a deed restriction for property conveyed by the City in 2007 at 313 N Whipple St and 3024-3030 W Fulton Blvd to Fulton-Whipple, LLC ("Owner"). The property was originally purchased from the City for \$170,000 and the sale included a deed restriction requiring that the property be used to build a parking lot within one year of the sale. The parking lot has not been constructed as required, and the Owner wishes to sell the property to Lawndale Educational Regional Network Charter School ("Buyer"), an Illinois not-for-profit corporation, for \$100,000. The ordinance amends the deed restriction, permitting the Buyer to construct an athletic field or surface parking lot to serve the Buyer's LEARN Excel elementary school, which is adjacent to the property.

Negotiated sale of City-owned property at 6411-6313 S Cicero Ave to Hollis of Palos, LLC-Midway Series

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Ward Affected: **13**

O2017-3281 The ordinance authorizes a redevelopment agreement with Hollis of Palos, LLC-Midway Series ("Developer") for city-owned property at 6411-6313 S Cicero Ave, located in the Archer TIF Redevelopment Project Area. The project budget is \$3,504,499. The Developer is purchasing the property from the City for \$1, the appraised fair market value of the property is \$1,320,000. The Developer proposes to construct a 4,000 sq. ft. Culver's restaurant on the property, with 45 parking spaces, outdoor seating, and a drive-thru accommodating 10 cars. 70% of the 20 new full-time jobs and 30 new part-time jobs created by the project will be reserved for

O2017-3221 The ordinance authorizes the sale of city-owned vacant properties at 2816-2818 W Monroe St to the 939 William R. Beahan Living Trust for \$12,000, the appraised fair market value of the property. The property must be improved with landscaped open space within six months of the sale.

Sale of City-owned property at 3508 W Flournoy St to JWB, LLC

Sponsor: **Mayor**

Wards Affected: **24**

O2017-3237 The ordinance authorizes the sale of a city-owned vacant property at 3508 W Flournoy St to JWB, LLC for \$1,850, the appraised fair market value of the property. The property is located in the Midwest Redevelopment Project Area. The property must be improved with landscaped open space within six months of the sale.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 2-120-500 by establishing Advisory Council on Arab Americans within Commission on Human Relations

O2017-3311 The ordinance amends the Code to establish an Advisory Council on Arab Americans within the Commission on Human Relations. The Commission on Human Relations enforces the Chicago Human Rights Ordinance and the Chicago Fair Housing Ordinance, investigates discrimination complaints, assists victims of hate crimes, and creates education and intervention programs to discourage bigotry.

Reaffirmation of commitment to restricting non-essential City-funded employee travel to State of North Carolina

R2017-291 The resolution continues to restrict all non-essential travel to North Carolina by an employee representing the City. North Carolina recently repealed Charlotte's anti-discrimination ordinance that expanded protection based on sexual orientation and gender identity and has barred any other North Carolina governmental body from enacting similar protections. While North Carolina partially repealed the law, the restriction of travel will continue until North Carolina acknowledges the rights of the LGBTQ community and treats all individuals fairly

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 4-4 by adding new Section 4-4-340 to allow non-customers use of public toilet facilities for emergency purposes

O2017-3200 The ordinance requires businesses to allow the public to use their restrooms in an emergency without a fee or the requirement to purchase something.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 4-384-060 by requiring owner's written consent for using electric collar on dogs

Sponsor: **O'Shea, Lopez, Smith, Sposato**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-3233 The ordinance amends the Code to require that every animal care facility that provides day care or boarding for dogs must obtain a dog owner's written, express consent, prior to using an electric collar on a dog.

Support for passage of Illinois Senate Bill 885 regarding contract for deed sales

R2017-292 The resolution supports the passage of IL S.B. 885, improving current regulations concerning deed sales, which are sales of property where title does not pass until all payments are made. The bill provides protection for potential property buyers, including requiring a written contract and deed recordation; a right of rescission; disclosure of: the amount of payments, the interest rate being charged, the term of the loan, and the assessed value of the property; an explanation as to when the buyer will obtain the title; the right the buyer has to an inspection and an appraisal of the property; and the right of the buyer to recover from a default.

MUNICIPAL CODE AMENDMENTS & ORDINANCES

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 4- 232 by adding new Section 4-232-125 concerning security measures for keys and dealer plates offered by motor vehicle salesroom

O2017-3222 The ordinance requires car dealerships to keep keys in lockboxes when closed. It further requires them to either secure specialty license plates with tamper-resistant screws or to also have the licenses in a lockbox.

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 9-124 by adding new Sections 9-124-483 and 9-124-485 concerning owner requirements to report firearm freight thefts and provide railroad freight security

Sponsors: **Burke, Cochran, Dowell**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-3303 The ordinance requires railroads to immediately report to the City any theft of firearms. Each hour of delay is a separate violation subject to a fine of \$200 to \$500.

Expenditure of Open Space Impact Fee funds and intergovernmental agreement with Chicago Board of Education for Wells Community Academy High School turf athletic field project

O2017-3230 The ordinance authorizes the transfer of funds generated from Open Space Fees paid by developments in the West Town Community Area up to \$1,700,000, to the City Board of Education to develop an artificial turf field for school and community use at the Wells Community Academy High School located in West Town.

Expenditure of Open Space Impact Fee funds for Throop Street River Park

O2017-3224 The ordinance authorizes the transfer of funds generated from Open Space Fees paid by developments in the Lower West Side Community Area up to \$40,000 to the Department of Planning and Development for capital improvements related to proposed design and planning of a new river park at Throop Street and the Chicago River.

Call for Department of Transportation utilization of roadway design programs and publications approved by Federal Highway Administration and use of post-consumer recyclable materials

R2017-297 The resolution calls on the Department of Transportation to utilize the roadway design programs and publications listed in this resolution approved by the Federal Highway Administration, including maximizing the use of post-consumer recyclable materials in the Department's hot mix asphalt road program.

Amendment of Municipal Code Chapter 10-36 by adding new Section 10-36-215 concerning ground handling services

O2017-3289 Amends the Code to require that ground handling service companies operating at O'Hare and Midway Airports must be subject to a collective bargaining agreement or Labor Peace Agreement with a labor union representing the company's employees. The agreement must prohibit the union and its members from engaging in strikes, boycotts, picketing, work stoppages, or other interference with business operations. Also requires ground handling service companies to pay wages, provide benefits, and working conditions equal to or above those prevailing in the locality, as set forth by the Building Owners Managers Association of Chicago.

Amendment of Municipal Code Section 4-6-180 by further regulating hotel employees health, safety and welfare

Sponsor: **Harris, Mitts, Fowlkes, Pawar, Laurino, Sadlowski Garza, Austin, Burnett, Dowell, King, Hairston, Quinn**

Wards Affected: **All**

O2017-3260 The ordinance requires hotels to equip employees who work in a guest room or rest room with a panic button at no charge to the employees. Hotels must develop a sexual harassment policy and comply with it. The policy must include a provision allowing workers the right to change floors during the duration of the purported offending guest's stay. Furthermore, this policy must give employees time off to make a complaint against a guest who allegedly sexually harassed them and to testify in court regarding the alleged sexual harassment.

Or2017-207 The resolution ends the financial relationship with six companies funding the Dakota Access Pipeline: PNC; CitiBank; US Bank; Bank of America; JP Morgan Chase; and Albank (as subsidiary of Citizens' Bank. The ban lasts for three years and includes deposits, underwriting and serving as a trustee, financial advisor or broker. The resolution also extends the current prohibition of doing business with Wells Fargo for an additional three years. The resolution lists eleven banks as alternatives.
